IV. Some general rules for doctoral training

- By fulfilling the courses five credits per course can be obtained.
- One course comprises the average of 2 hours per week for full-time doctoral students, while 7 hours/semester for part-time students. The lessons can be held in blocks.
- Up to one third of the lessons can be held in the form of consultations.
- The Doctoral School does not offer lectures separately for full-time and part-time students. Part-time students may not be required to attend lectures exceeding 7 hours per semester in one course.
- Evaluation of the students' achievements in a course is five-graded (from 1 to 5); 5 being the best mark, while 1 meaning that the student failed.
- In one academic year an elective course is offered only in one semester.
