European Commission has the formal role as initiator of the legislative proposals, the Council of the European Union and the Parliament decide European jointly, and adopt the legal acts. curriculum presents The various supranational, national and sub-national institutions and actors that contribute to the EU legislative process, and also provides rich methodological, conceptual and empirical explorations of public policies, debating its rationale, validity and appropriateness.

Freedom, Security and Justice in Europe

The Area of Freedom, Security and Justice is a specific policy field of the European Union; part of this policy is a European criminal policy, its study requires a radically different and specific approach. While studying about the Area of Freedom, Security and Justice, the student gains an **understanding** of connections between states in matters of criminal justice; learns to identify the innovative power of European integration in filling ('traditional') gaps cooperation between states criminal matters. Students also learn how pure European law can traditional national affect criminal law, and we come understand how EU criminal courtrooms emerges and how politicians influence criminal justice issues.

International Commercial and Investment Arbitration

China is the largest exporting and the second largest foreign direct investment recipient country in the World. Commercial and investment agreements (contracts) usually contain arbitration clauses, that is to say, the possibility of dispute settlement by non-state decisionmakers (arbitrators) chosen by the parties to the agreement. The award (decision) of the arbitrators in international arbitration is final and binding, and there international treaties that will help the winning party to enforce the award. This course will provide a comprehensive introduction to international commercial and investment arbitration, and will cover both theoretical and practical aspects, issues jurisdiction, arbitration agreement, arbitrators, the arbitration process, applicable law and recognition and enforcement of arbitral awards.

International Negotiation and Intercultural Communication

This course gives an introduction to intercultural communication and international negotiations, to of culture the role communication and negotiation, and cultural differences and their effect on communication. After providing the theoretical basis, it focuses on practical problems in different fields of two negotiation: the public/diplomatic field and the private/business field. Students knowledge gain characteristics of main cultures and improve negotiation skills by recognizing their influence on communication.

Introduction to Comparative Common Law

This course will provide an insight into the development of common law tradition. Students will be familiarised with key points both historical and legal in the formation of the common law. The main objective is for students to gain a deep insight into the key concepts and workings of this unique area. This will be achieved by carrying out a comparative study of the UK, US, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand. The use of case law and precedent will be instrumental in enabling students to understand the nuanced legal problems. The course will enable students to acquire indepth knowledge of thematic topics as they developed across different countries using the tool of common law to interpret them.
